

WHAT'S **YOUR** PARENTING STYLE?



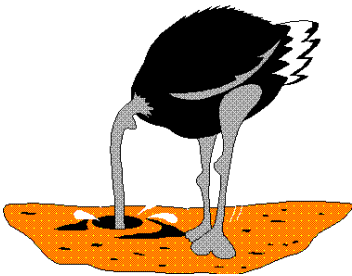
PREPARED

Continually nags their teen instead of implementing a driving plan.



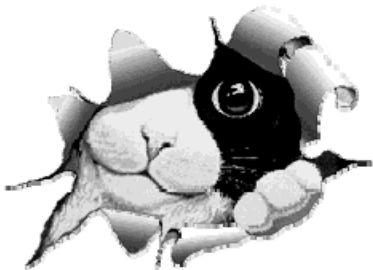
BUSY BEAVER
